






The Thesis Statement



1. Appears in the Introduction

2. Expresses your main idea or argument



3. Is reinforced in the Body Paragraphs that follow


4. Is restated in the Conclusion

The Introduction
















The Body Paragraphs



Main idea

Specific details







THE CONCLUSION

- 1. Summarize your main points.
- 2. Reconnect your reader to your thesis.
- 3. Remind your reader what the purpose of your essay was.
- 4. Do NOT introduce new ideas.





PLAGIARIZING

Using someone else's words or ideas without giving them credit is a kind of stealing.





HOW NOT TO PLAGIARIZE

- 1. Use your own words.
- 2. Keep track of what you read as you read it.
- 3. Cite (insert) the source information.
- 4. Remember to use quotation marks.





HOW NOT TO PLAGIARIZE




When in doubt, leave it out.

Proofreading is one of the keys to successful writing.

grammar mistakes

misspellings



wrong word use

omissions

awkward phrases







PROOFREADING Rule of Thumb



If you have to read a sentence more than twice to figure out what it means, there's something you need to fix.










1. Find a quiet place.

2. Read your writing out loud SLOWLY.
